It also leaves the telephone lines available for the most vulnerable residents.

Face-to-face support

People who can't get online to access council services are now able to get face-to-face support from library staff across the area.

A trial scheme launched last year where customer service officers visited libraries to help people in person who couldn't access services online or over the phone.

The service was well received but usage very low in most locations.

An alternative plan has been developed where library staff can now offer this face-to-face support rather than customer services officers.

This means people can access support for longer periods and in more locations.

For complex enquiries where an immediate answer can't be given, an appointment will be offered for a later date.

This new system is now being rolled out gradually across all libraries.



Frequency of North Somerset Life reducing



Grants for home energy measures



Low income households in North Somerset without gas central heating may be eligible for a new round of funding to install energysaving, low carbon heating measures in their homes.

North Somerset Council has partnered with Bath and North East Somerset Council and Bristol City Council on the second round of the Bright Green Homes project, which is being administered by Bristol City Leap.

The scheme will deliver energy efficient and cost-saving measures which also reduce carbon emissions, as part of the council's commitment to tackling the climate emergency.

A wide range of insulation and lowcarbon technologies can be funded, including:

- external wall insulation
- cavity wall insulation
- loft insulation
- underfloor insulation
- air source heat pump
- solar PV panels.

To qualify for the funding you must meet these criteria:

- your property must not use gas central heating – the scheme is only open to people who use oil, wood, LPG or electric heating systems
- have a combined annual household income of £31,000 or lower
- live in North Somerset.

If you meet the eligibility criteria, complete the online questionnaire at **www.smartsurvey.co.uk/s/56OGQZ** and the project team at Bristol City Leap will contact you to discuss the next steps.

Together with the other councils, North Somerset Council successfully bid for £11m government funding to help local households install technologies which reduce carbon emissions and lower energy costs.

The criteria for eligibility were established by the government's Department for Energy Security and Net Zero (DESNZ).

Promoting wellbeing in older people

New Tai Chi QiGong sessions are launching in North Somerset to enhance wellbeing and independence of older people.

Local charity Age UK Somerset is expanding its Ageing Well service and is launching these new classes locally.



QiGong, pronounced 'chee gung', is a form of Tai Chi that is beneficial to both physical and mental wellbeing.

It consists of 18 gentle movements and is specially designed for people aged over 55.

Classes are being held across North Somerset including in Bleadon, Kewstoke, Nailsea, Portishead, Weston, and Worle.

An outdoor class in Weston-super-Mare has also launched, as well as an online class for those who can't get out.

These classes have been set up thanks to new grant funding (see page 8). Classes cost £5 per session (£4 online) and cater for all levels and experience.

Ensuring communities are at the heart of public health

Community and voluntary groups in North Somerset have been awarded thousands of pounds in funding to run local projects that improve health and wellbeing.

Funding has been awarded to projects addressing mental health, social prescribing and for community food projects, helping to improve the wellbeing of people across North Somerset.

Community groups are valuable because they help people connect, create resilient and more cohesive communities, engage with those at most risk of poor health, empower people to have a greater say in their lives and health, and help to reduce health inequalities.

Six existing and new community food projects have received a share of £30,000 to encourage nutritious and affordable food choices, healthy eating and to improve food knowledge and skills.

These include:

- Boombox Youth Projects young people aged 11 to 18 have been learning how to cook healthily.
- Brown Rock Community Garden

 weekly gardening sessions
 where participants learn to grow
 their own food, such as fruit and vegetables.

- Pill Youth Club cooking and growing sessions, learning what's in season and within budget.
- Theatre Orchard solidarity suppers, bringing together members of the refugee and asylum seeker communities to share recipes and cooking skills, along with social events.
- Weston Foodbank self-help cookery courses, helping those in food poverty.
- XTND: Improving Futures parent and child cooking group, taking place in local primary schools.



Warmer weather and longer days provide the perfect opportunity to use pedal power as a way of getting around.

North Somerset boasts a host of traffic-free routes providing the ideal way to get to events, pop to the shops, commute to work or explore the countryside.

Key cycling routes include:

- Strawberry Line Path starts at Yatton train station, with bike hire available from Strawberry Cycles, to Cheddar. Visit www. strawberrycycles.com
- Festival Way Nailsea to central Bristol
- River Avon Trail (also known as the Pill Path) – this stone path runs from Pill/Ham Green to the Cumberland Basin and is most comfortable on a mountain bike.
- Brean Down Way a 20mph zone has been introduced in Uphill to make this otherwise traffic-free route from Weston to Brean seafront stress-free. From here you can continue on road (or beach, with a mountain bike) to Brean Down. Hire a bike from www.ebikeufo.co.uk, based in The Sovereign, Weston, or from www.breanbikehire.co.uk
- The Pier to Pier Way a new 13-mile cycle route linking Weston-super-Mare and Clevedon. It is aimed at commuters, leisure users and tourists and will open this year. For updates visit www.n-somerset. gov.uk/piertopierway

Cycle routes also run through towns to give easy access to work or shops, such as route 33 through Weston-super-Mare and route 26 in Portishead.

As well as offering a carbon-free way to travel, cycling also provides a great way to get active, which has physical and mental health benefits.

If you don't own a bike but would like to give cycling a go then you can borrow a bike.



Visit www.n-somerset.gov.uk/cycling to find out more about the borrow a bike scheme and other information including route maps.

Printed copies of the North Somerset cycle map can be picked up from libraries, sports centres and community centres, as well as cycle and independent shops near key cycle routes.

Free-to-use outdoor bicycle pumps are located at train stations and other key locations (shown on the cycle map) across North Somerset if your tyres need a top up.

If you are visiting a leisure centre, North Somerset Council has recently installed secure cycle lockers outside Strode (Clevedon), Parish Wharf (Portishead) and Hutton Moor (Weston-super-Mare).

Lockers are free of charge and anyone wanting to use them just needs to pop into reception for a key.

Hesitant cyclists or those new to riding a bike may also benefit from training.



Cycle training is about improving your skills and awareness and will help you feel more confident and be safe on the roads. It is recommended for all cyclists.

Bikeability courses for children are offered through schools and those that miss out can attend holiday courses organised by Life Cycle UK.

Extra funding for active travel

Cycling, walking or wheeling across North Somerset will be made easier thanks to more than £400.000 of funding.

North Somerset Council has secured the money from Active Travel England to go towards improving pedestrian and cyclist crossings over roads, safety improvements on routes to schools and opening a new section of the Strawberry Line.

A number of crossings will be improved by reducing the waiting time at priority locations across the area, providing a new zebra crossing on a route to school in

Weston-super-Mare, and safety improvements to some of the Festival Way's junctions.

Funding has also been received to make safety improvements outside several schools through the provision of 'School Streets', and to provide a small but key section of missing link which will open up the Strawberry Line in Yatton North End and help link into the upcoming Pier to Pier Way route from Weston to Clevedon.

The Pier to Pier Way, which opens this year, includes a new one-mile traffic-free route crossing the River Yeo.

This means pedestrians, cyclists and equestrians will be able to avoid the busy A370 and save four miles on their usual journey.





W#ST link

Innovative new on-demand buses are now providing useful transport links for people across North Somerset.

WESTlink launched in April as 'demand responsive transport', meaning buses go where they're needed without a set timetable or route.

People have been using it as a standalone service to get to college, work, shops and the cinema, as well as connecting to the wider public transport network for onward travel.

Smaller vehicles are used so they can go to areas which were previously inaccessible to larger buses, meaning communities that had been without a local bus service now have new opportunities to travel.

Wendy Clegg, from Clevedon, said: "I was desperate to get to Dundry for an event but there was no easy transport links from Clevedon.

"I downloaded the WESTLink app the day before. I'm not a confident smartphone user but it was easy. "I had a text that night confirming my booking, then another the next morning with an approximate pickup time.

"The bus picked me up and we had a lovely, comfortable ride.

"It was very easy, with reassuring texts, a good app and friendly driver. I will be happy to book the WESTlink bus again and again."

WESTlink buses run Monday to Saturday, from 7am to 7pm (except public holidays).

Journeys can be booked through an app, website or phone, either when you need it or the day before.

Ways to book:

- phoning the call centre on 0117 457 8561, charged at local rates

Tracking software means you can see exactly where your bus is and when it will get to you.

You could also ask to be picked up or dropped off somewhere that doesn't have a physical bus stop, such as a doctor's surgery, pharmacy or local shop.

A single fare for any journey length within the operating zone is £2 for adults and £1 for children*.

All concessionary and older person's bus passes are accepted.

Pay with a credit or debit card via the app, or pay the driver in cash with the exact change.

Buses plays a key part **WEST OF** in North Somerset **ENGLAND** Council's response to the climate emergency, as transport makes up 40 per cent of North Somerset's greenhouse gas emissions.

The council is working with the West of England Combined Authority to help make bus travel the first choice over car usage.

It hopes bus travel will become faster, more convenient and coordinated, and better for your pocket than running a car.

WESTlink has been launched as part of the Bus Service Improvement Plan.

North Somerset Council was awarded almost £48m in capital funding from the Department for Transport last year to improve bus services over the next three years. There is also a pooled revenue fund of £57.5m shared with the combined authority.

More ways to travel by train or bus

Bus and train routes across North Somerset have been enhanced to make it easier for people to travel sustainably.

North Somerset Council is working with local operators to improve bus services across the area.

Recent changes include:

- a new stop at Worle train station for the A3 (Airport Flyer). An hourly service, 22 hours a day
- a new X10 service linking Clevedon. Weston-in-Gordano. Portishead and Cribbs Causeway, with three round trips Monday to Friday and four on a Saturday
- X1 Bristol to Weston now runs every 15 minutes
- X4 Bristol to Portishead now runs every 20 minutes

- X5 Portishead to Weston now has additional journeys plus the introduction of a weekend service
- X6/7 Bristol to Clevedon now has additional early and late journeys
- X8 Bristol to Nailsea/Backwell has been reintroduced
- W3/7 around Weston now has additional evening journeys.





The government also recently announced the £2 bus fare cap (£1 for children up to 16) has been extended until the end of October.

Nailsea Library's new home

Popular Nailsea Library is moving into its new home - securing its long-term future for generations to come.





The library is moving from its original location in Somerset Square into Colliers Walk, in the unit formerly occupied by HSBC bank, after North Somerset Council signed a 125-year lease on the new site.

At the time of Life going to print, it was hoped the move would be completed by early summer.

The move forms part of the council's strategy to have modern, accessible libraries where people can enjoy a variety of services.

These include:

- free access to computers, the internet and digital support
- hosting community support and advice sessions
- providing activities for families and people of all ages
- providing access to more than 2.5 million items through the LibrariesWest consortium.

The former 50-year-old building in Somerset Square is beyond its end of life.

It is in poor condition, in need of repairs to the roof because of regular flooding, and is very energy inefficient. It also doesn't meet modern accessibility standards.

Digital facilities are also being improved at both the new Nailsea Library and Portishead Library, thanks to £30,545 government funding from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

The funding is helping to set up Extended Access in Nailsea. Registered users will be able to visit the library to borrow books and use the computers and wifi outside of staffed hours when the service launches this autumn.

In Portishead, the funding has been used to install a Nook pod, where people can study and work online, have one-to-one-meetings and charge devices.

North Somerset Council is continuing to investigate options for the future of the former Nailsea library site.

This will tie in with the council's emerging placemaking strategy for Nailsea, which is a vision of building a contemporary identity and renewing the town centre as a destination.

Long summer evenings are on the horizon and it can be tempting to enjoy a tipple while relaxing and enjoying the warmer weather.

Drinking alcohol is often associated with having a good time but the odd glass of wine or pint of beer can quickly escalate to two or three glasses on most days.

Men and women are advised to limit their drinking to no more than 14 units of alcohol a week – the equivalent to six pints of average strength beer, or nine small or seven standard glasses of average strength wine.

Regularly drinking more than this can harm your health, including increasing your risk of cancer and liver disease as well as weight gain.

Reducing your alcohol intake can have a major impact on your life, improving your physical and mental health both in the short and long-term.

It results in less hangovers, better quality sleep, weight loss and improved mental wellbeing, as well as being good for your pockets as you start to save money.

North Somerset Council is working with other organisations in the North Somerset Combatting Drugs Partnership to try and reduce the harms caused by substances, including alcohol, and is commissioning services to support people to drink less.

If you're thinking about cutting down your alcohol consumption, the Better Health North Somerset website has lots of useful tips and advice. There are details of how to contact the council's healthy lifestyle advisers, who can give free advice on how to form healthier habits and reach healthy lifestyle goals, including drinking less alcohol.

Top tips for drinking responsibly this summer

- Have several drink-free days each week.
- Tell your friends and family you're cutting down and that it's important to you – they could support you.
- Make it smaller still enjoy a drink but have smaller sizes. Try bottled beer instead of pints or a small glass of wine instead of large.
- Drink lower-strength swap strong beers or wines for those with a lower strength (ABV in %).
- Stay hydrated drink a glass of water first and then alternate alcoholic drinks with nonalcoholic ones.
- Try alcohol-free alternatives, such as 'No-secco' and 'virgin cocktails'.



Protecting people on Weston's beach

Dedicated seafront rangers work 365 days a year to help keep Weston-super-Mare's beach safe for everyone.

The rangers are trained to deal with a wide variety of incidents and are usually the first on the scene to deal with any accidents and emergencies.

Joe Webber leads the team of three. He said:

"We're on-hand to keep the beach a safe, clean and pleasurable place to be."

This means carrying oxygen and defibrillators to treat any lifethreatening emergencies, to dealing with anti-social behaviour issues such as littering or public disputes.

Between March and September last year the seafront rangers assisted with eight landings of the air ambulance, 69 missing persons reports, 67 minor to major first aid incidents, and 81 calls from the coastguard emergency control room to observe or rectify incidents, or to request back up from emergency services.

The team are trained first responders and have recently undergone mental health training to deal with the increased number of mental health incidents they now face.

Joe said: "The ranger team are a credit and a lovely group of individuals. I am so proud of them."

During high tides, the rangers work with other council officers to shut all necessary flood gates along the seafront.

They also undertake a number of natural environment tasks, such as monitoring and recording sand levels to help the flood risk management

In winter months, the rangers do a variety of maintenance work to keep the seafront looking great, as well as being safe, and are on standby to help clear up any storm damage.

How to stay safe on the beach

Always check tide times before you head out. Visit www.n-somerset.gov.uk/ tidetimes

Never walk out to the sea when the tide is out due to the sinking mud and extremely fast incoming tides.

If anyone is in danger to call 999 and ask for the coastguard.

Start the walk at Yatton train station, a Grade II listed

building dating from 1841.

Walk to the end of the car park next to platform one (trains bound for Weston-super-Mare), and the start of the Strawberry Line path.

The path follows the former Cheddar Valley Railway line, built in 1869. It was known as the Strawberry Line because of its cargo from the strawberry fields of Cheddar.

Despite being a busy junction, it closed in 1965 and a wealth of wildlife habitats then flourished.

The line now forms part of a ninemile almost traffic-free National Cycle Network route, number 26.

Information boards give details of the area's history and what to look out for.

Benches are installed at regular intervals, including a mosaic seat made by pupils of Yatton Junior School in 2000 to celebrate Roman remains found nearby.



The path will come to a rhyne so cross over the small bridge here and then head immediately left down Moor Lane.

Walk towards the A370. Before crossing the bridge over the River



Yeo, go through the kissing gate on your left-hand side and into the field.

This is a well-used permissive path which crosses three small fields. Keep dogs on leads here and follow the edge of the river. Congresbury will be ahead of you.

Before entering the final field, veer to your left towards the gap in the trees/hedge.

Continue on through the field towards the houses and you'll reach another kissing gate leading out onto the B3133.

Head left up this road for about a quarter of a mile, passing Cadbury Garden Centre on the other side of the road, until you get to The Pet Studio dog kennels.

Take the track on your left, just after the kennels.

Follow this track for about a guarter of a mile and there is a kissing gate in the hedge on your right-hand side (if you get to the farmhouse you've gone too far).

Walk left around the edge of the field towards the top corner. There is a wide gate with a kissing gate next to it. Go through here, and continue ahead across the next field, keeping to the right-hand edge next to the trees.

Go through the kissing gate at the end, with a footpath leading onto Mendip Road.

Turn left onto Mendip Road and

The public footpath continues behind the garages. At the large stone, go right and follow the footpath behind the houses, which leads to St Mary's Church.

Follow the footpath through the graveyard to Yatton High Street, where you can turn left and head back to the station.





Climate emergency

Take action on food waste



Every year in the UK about seven million tonnes – £10bn worth – of food is wasted in homes.

For the average UK family, this means about £700 of food shopping goes in the bin every year.

As well as this being a waste of money, it is also a key driver of climate change.


Huge amounts of land, energy and water are needed for food production; raw materials are needed for packaging; and transportation creates carbon emissions, particularly if the food has been flown-in from far away.

If this food is then not eaten, all those resources required to produce it and get it to your home are worthless.

Dealing with the food thrown away then requires even more resources, including transportation emissions from collection vehicles, as well as energy and water at the processing facility.

Statistics for food waste are staggering. Research from the charity Waste and Resources Action Programme (WRAP) found that every day in the UK we waste 24 million slices of bread, 5.8 million potatoes and 4.4 million apples.

While some of this is unavoidable, such as peelings, cores and bones, the majority is, or once was, perfectly good food.



- eat all edible parts of your food
- check dates and cook food that needs using up first
- have one day a week to use leftover food
- freeze excess amounts and use another day
- serve smaller portions.



How can you help tackle the climate emergency?

- 1. Reduce food waste
- 2. Recycle unavoidable food waste either by home composting (see page 29) or using the council's weekly food waste collection service



Reduce food waste in the first place

Did you know that most foods can be frozen before they reach their 'use before' date?

Most fruit, vegetables, milk. cheese, meat, fish and bread can be portioned up and frozen to be used another day.

Recycling food waste

Eating and enjoying our food is the best thing we can do with it.

For unavoidable waste, it's very important that it's processed in a way which limits its negative environmental impact.

A recent waste analysis in North Somerset found that 27 per cent (almost a third) of the contents of an average black rubbish bin is food waste.

Food waste put into a black bin is not recycled. Instead, it goes to Avonmouth to be burnt at an energy-from-waste plant.

This process creates carbon dioxide, a damaging greenhouse gas, which contributes to climate change.

If you recycle your food waste instead, you'll limit these emissions while also reducing odours and creating extra space in your black waste bin.

There are two ways to recycle food waste in North Somerset - home composting or the council's weekly kerbside collection service.

If you'd like to learn how to home compost, a **free** e-learning Master Composter course is available online. Find out more at www.n-somerset. gov.uk/composting.

For kerbside collections, households are given a small caddy for collecting food waste in the kitchen and a larger food waste box to put outside for the weekly collection.

If your containers are missing or damaged, request more at www.nsomerset.gov.uk/food-waste.



Some people living in flats now have access to a communal food waste bin. North Somerset Council is continuing to introduce these across the area.

Food waste collected from households currently goes to an anaerobic digestion plant in Westonsuper-Mare to be processed.

The methane released as the food rots down is collected and converted safely into biogas, which is used to generate electricity to power homes.

It also creates a nutrient-rich fertiliser which is sold to local farmers for agriculture and land regeneration.

Minimise waste to help tac

Minimising the amount of waste we create can help tackle the climate emergency.

As a community, we all have a responsibility to reduce the amount of waste we produce.

It not only benefits the environment but also helps to save valuable resources and reduces the cost of waste disposal.

North Somerset Council wants to change the way we all think about waste, to instead see it as a resource to be utilised and its value recovered.

The council's waste strategy was launched early last year and set out some key targets.

These include increasing the recycling rate to 70 per cent and reducing residual waste by 15 per cent from 2019/20 levels by 2030. Progress is being made on these targets and the full first annual report is available online at

www.n-somerset.gov.uk/ wastestrategy

Latest figures show that households in North Somerset are still producing more waste now than they did before the pandemic, but this has reduced slightly from when more of us were at home during lockdown

Recycling has gone up significantly in the last year but is still below prepandemic levels.

Results from the 2021 census are giving a rich picture of all people and households in North Somerset.

The once-a-decade survey, carried out by the Office for National Statistics (ONS), is the most complete source of information about the overall population that we have.

Information from it gives central and local government, health authorities and many other organisations the data to target their resources more effectively, and to plan for housing, education, health and transport services for years to come.

Across the country, 97 per cent of households responded to the latest census, giving a huge insight into the way we live currently.

Results from the survey are being released in batches, once the ONS has completed its processing and quality assurance.

North Somerset Council has worked with the ONS to give local insight and ensure the best possible statistics for the area.

Here's the overall snapshot of how North Somerset looks:

- The population of North Somerset has continued to grow.
 On census day there were 216,700 people, compared to 202,600 in the 2011 census.
- The average age on census day was 45.
- Our population profile is different from the national profile. We have a higher percentage of people aged over 65 and a lower percentage of children and young people aged under 19.





Diversity

North Somerset has an increasingly diverse population.

- 8.4 per cent of people were born outside the UK compared to 17.4 in England.
- 5.1 per cent were born in other European countries, compared with 7.2 per cent in England.
- 6.8 per cent of households have members from different ethnic groups, compared with 10.1 per cent in England.
- 4.8 per cent of households do not have English as their main language, compared with 10.7 per cent in England.

Identity

- 45.3 per cent of people do not identify as having a religion, compared with 36.7 per cent in England.
- 46.6 per cent identify as being Christian, and 8.1 per cent identify as other religions or did not answer.
- 90.6 per cent identify as heterosexual and 2.6 per cent as LGB+ (6.8 per cent didn't answer).

gender identity to birth (5.2 per cent didn't answer).

Disability and health

- 83 per cent of people have good or very good health, but 4.9 per cent have bad or very bad health.
- 7 per cent people are disabled (under the Equalities Act), with their day-to-day activities limited a lot, and 10.7 per cent are disabled with their day-to-day activities limited a little.
- 8.8 per cent of people aged over five are unpaid carers, with 2.4 per cent providing more than 50 hours a week of unpaid care.

Work and travel

- 59.7 per cent of people aged over 16 are economically active, excluding full-time students.
- 1.9 per cent are economically active but unemployed.
- Of those that are economically inactive, 28 per cent are retired and 3.6 per cent are on long-term sick leave or disabled.
- 32.6 per cent of people work mainly from home and 30.3 travel less than 10km to work (with 12.1 per cent travelling less than 2km).

North Somerset Council is now analysing the data to better understand the local area and population.

New initiatives to increase local prosperity

Community organisations, charities, social enterprises and businesses across North Somerset can now access a range of grants and support thanks to funding designed to improve skills and life chances.

North Somerset Council received £2.5m from the government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) to be used until April 2025 for projects which will empower communities, support local businesses and develop employment and skills opportunities.

The council consulted with local organisations and partners and, as a result, several schemes have been developed.

Here's a round-up of some of what's on offer...

Community grants

More than £200,000 has been distributed to 17 organisations across North Somerset, to deliver arts and heritage work, community engagement schemes, and social action projects, in the first round of the UKSPF community grants programme.

Voluntary Action North Somerset (VANS) supported applicants to apply for these grants by providing free workshops about submitting high quality bids.

Future funding rounds will be coming soon so anyone interested is encouraged to apply.

Business support for not-for-profits

Charities, social enterprises and community organisations in North Somerset can access free targeted business support until next April.

The capacity building scheme aims to provide not-for-profit organisations with skills to increase their sustainability.

Raise Partnership is delivering this programme of targeted support, which could cover bid writing, business planning, governance structure or any other expert guidance.

Many organisations suffer from lack of a suitable site so Raise is also working to suggest empty buildings which could be given a new lease of life.

Raise managing director, Richard Savory, said: "The not-for-profit sector is full of inspirational people.

"We are engaging with so many already, from community singing to teaching English to refugees, to those working within village youth clubs and historic buildings."

Net zero grants available

Small and medium-sized businesses can get support with lowering their carbon footprint through the new Net Zero **Business Grants Programme.**

Grants of up to £30,000 are available for energy efficiency measures, including LED replacements, draught proofing and air source heat pumps.

Match-funding of up to 70 per cent is available for businesses, depending on the size, location and type of project.

Free carbon surveys are available from this summer, with grant applications going live in January.

Continued help with the rising cost of living

Rising interest rates and high inflation are still a worry for millions of people.

Energy prices will be coming down in July but food prices are still higher than last year and climbing interest rates means we're still paying more for goods and services.

With no end in sight to the costof-living crisis, North Somerset Council wants to do all it can to help residents with energy, food, water, transport and housing bills.

Last year a taskforce was set up to respond to the crisis locally, in partnership with key organisations.

A network of community living rooms was established over the winter for residents to stay warm. and the council hosted a cost-ofliving event with its partners.

Support for households

A further £2.6m has recently been awarded to North Somerset Council from the government's Household Support Fund to support those most in need in the area.

This is on top of the £4m received in previous years.

The money will be spent supporting the most vulnerable residents, including families with children, pensioners, care leavers, children eligible for free school meals, as well as those 'just about managing'.

It is being distributed through fixed automatic food vouchers to individuals on certain benefits as well as grants to organisations, including the Handy Person service, Salvation Army, Fuel Bank and Citizens Advice Bureau Surviving Winter grant.

A portion of the funding is allocated to residents who are financially vulnerable but do not meet one of the identified categories for support.

Transformation of Weston-super-Mare accelerating

The transformation of culture, leisure and retail in Weston-super-Mare has received a significant boost thanks to £23m of funding.

Exciting regeneration projects are being planned across the town after North Somerset Council was awarded £20m from the government's Levelling Up Fund earlier this year, matched with £3m of its own funds.

The money is designed to create jobs and boost the economy and will be used to reinvent iconic heritage buildings, support local businesses, and deliver a year-round economy for the future.

Several high-profile sites are receiving investment.

Birnbeck Pier

Work to restore historic and muchloved Grade II* Birnbeck Pier may be able to proceed soon.

After significant delays, the Compulsory Purchase Order (CPO) inquiry regarding the transfer of Birnbeck Pier to North Somerset Council is expected to take place at the end of July, at the Town Hall in Weston-super-Mare.

The CPO was first served to the private owner in 2020 but due to an objection put to the courts by the

owner asking for a 'stay', the CPO has not yet been through the formal inquiry process required.

The owner finally withdrew his case last November, allowing the formal CPO process to proceed.

If successful. North Somerset Council can secure ownership and move forward with saving the Victorian pier from decline.

Project managers and architects have been appointed and a planning application is expected to be submitted later this year, with work starting in 2024.

The wider pier project has already secured emergency funding to strengthen the pier 'legs' and save it from collapse, with £3.55m from the National Heritage Memorial Fund.

The first payment of £234,760 from a £4.52m funding pot from the National Heritage Lottery Fund will also be used to develop detailed proposals for the restoration and reuse of Birnbeck's buildings.

The additional Levelling Up Fund money will allow buildings at the pier to be restored and brought back into use, creating facilities such as a visitor centre and café.

Tropicana



An exercise was launched in March to invite potential operators to submit their ideas for the future running of the iconic building.

The response was extremely positive and the discussions are helping North Somerset Council confirm plans for this unique seafront location.

This includes expanding the capacity to 8,000 and enhancing the outdoor area so it can be used as an arena for larger events and mini festivals.

Marine Lake



Marine Lake underwent a £300,000 upgrade last year to help turn it into a destination for water sports and outdoor swimming.

The popular lake was closed and drained to allow 30,000 tonnes of compacted silt to be removed.

Further works are still needed and Levelling Up funding will be used to do this.

This includes completing the dredging of the deep end, finishing repairs to the surround and installing extra facilities for users.

Surveys are under way and this additional work will begin this autumn.

Grove Park



Grove Park is an important place for local people to enjoy and relax.

Levelling Up Funding will be used to improve the entrance, including improved toilet facilities.

North Somerset Council will be working with groups such as the Friends of Grove Park to understand what they'd like to see there.

Weston town centre



Empty retail units are the focus of investment in Weston town centre.

Surveys have been carried out and the first set of empty units will be refitted in the autumn to make them more attractive for potential tenants.

A sustainable future

These projects have been chosen because they were identified as priorities during consultation for the creation of the SuperWeston placemaking strategy.

North Somerset Council is working with partners and contractors to maximise the long-term benefits of Levelling Up Fund investments.

This includes targeting jobs and training for those who live nearby and working with local community groups to involve them in how the facilities will be developed and used.

Projects will be as environmentally sustainable as possible, such as sourcing sustainable materials.

Finding a job which makes a real difference in the community while fitting in around other commitments might be easier than you think.

More care workers are urgently needed in North Somerset to help some of the area's most vulnerable residents.

Whether you're returning to work after a break or looking for a change in career, there is a variety of jobs in the health and social care sector which could fit around your life.

We care. Could you?

Becoming a care worker means you could make a positive impact on people's lives.

Some of the most in-demand jobs include working in people's homes to help them remain independent or support them to access services in their community, working in nursing and care homes, supporting someone with a learning disability or mental health condition, or being a personal assistant.

Yves Tshomba, a domiciliary care worker from Weston-super-Mare, won the Home Care Worker Award at the Great British Care Awards in March this year.

He was nominated by colleagues and clients at Access Your Care. one of North Somerset Council's domiciliary care lead providers.

Yves said: "I decided to join the care sector so I could play a role in supporting those who are vulnerable and give them little of the happiness life has to provide.

"It was the greatest decision in my career. I come across amazing people with incredible stories.

"To receive this award from an organisation I admire so much makes me totally happy and grateful. To be honoured by your peers is incredibly gratifying and I am so thankful."



Q&A with Poppy Carson, Proud to Care Project Lead

Why is there such a demand for care workers?

Due to our ageing population, there will always be a demand for people who can help others stay as independent as possible. whether that's in the person's own home or a care home. You'll be helping them get the most out of each day.

Can it fit around my life?

Working in social care can provide a great work/life balance. You can work part time, doing split shifts to allow for the school run, or working hours to fit around your family or other commitments.

Does it mean unsociable hours?

It may do – but helping people get ready for bed, making sure they're safe for the night, and bringing a smile to them during weekends and holidays, can be very rewarding. It's also good for your own wellbeing to know that your time is having a positive impact on other people's lives.



What qualifications can I get? How can I develop my career?

Working in care brings many opportunities for development. With experience you may specialise in a certain area or become a team leader. With further qualifications you could progress as a manager, social worker or occupational therapist. However, you don't need to do formal qualifications if you choose not to, as you'll be developing transferrable skills and gaining life experience.

How do I get a job?

You can apply direct and receive on-the-job training. Having the right values is the most important thing. If you are kind and enjoy helping others, there will be a job for you. Other routes into the care sector including college courses and apprenticeships.

North Somerset Council will also be visiting local schools to talk about the Proud to Care campaign, and developing a health and care ambassador scheme.





Play areas across North Somerset have become brighter and better places for all children to enjoy thanks to hundreds of thousands of pounds investment.

During the last year, improvements have been carried out to make play areas more accessible and inclusive to children and young people of all ages, from toddlers to teenagers and those with special educational needs and/or disabilities.

Play areas are important to communities and are vital for children's physical, mental and emotional health.

Free, outdoor play can boost resilience, confidence and social skills.

Seven of North Somerset Council's own play areas were improved after the council committed to £300,000 investment from its capital budget.

A consultation was carried out last summer and feedback received gave the council a better understanding of what families wanted and what the priorities should be.

In addition to North Somerset Council's own play areas, 23 play areas run by town and parish councils, community groups and a Business Improvement District have also been improved thanks to the £250,000 Improving Play Spaces Fund.

Organisations could apply to this fund and had to agree to matchfund the amount they received, therefore doubling the investment amount.

Awards ranged from £2,000 to £25,000 and play areas of different sizes across the area benefitted, from one piece of equipment to multiple pieces.

In Castle Batch, in Worle, Westonsuper-Mare, an all-inclusive play area has been built, providing opportunities for physical development, sensory simulation and social interaction.

Two brand new play areas have also been created, at Alexandra Gardens in Clevedon and at Failand Village Hall.

Residents get Hard Hat Ready

Six local people looking for work have been learning construction skills on a new course held at the site of a secondary school expansion currently being built in Weston-super-Mare.

The three-week Hard Hat Ready courses are taking place at Winterstoke Hundred Academy Expansion in Locking Parklands, and offer residents the opportunity to explore a career in construction.

The courses, hosted in partnership with project contractors Kier and Weston College, give participants the chance to learn key employability skills, take part in hands-on work experience such as health and safety and site management, and study and gain a Construction Skills Certification (CSCS) card.

In addition, attendees also have the chance to meet employers in the

industry which, in combination with the CSCS card, can help open doors to jobs in construction.

Hard Hat Ready is taking place at the Sustainability Lab on the site of the Winterstoke Hundred Academy Expansion.

The Sustainability Lab is a learning pavilion that will offer both young people and adults the chance to learn how they can access jobs and training in the growing green construction industry.

Some of the future workshops and activities hosted there will focus on sustainability and construction training, both run in both small

groups and on a one-to-one basis.

Once the expansion of Winterstoke Hundred Academy opens, the Sustainability Lab will continue as a space for community use.

The school expansion will provide up to 900 school places so that more young people can access schooling in North Somerset.

The three-storey building is designed to some of the highest standards of sustainability, set to achieve Net Zero carbon in operation, a much-sought BREEAM 'excellent' rating for energy efficiency and a 10 per cent biodiversity net gain, which will protect and promote plants and wildlife.
