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Dear reader,



As you are aware, local councils across the country have had funding cuts since 2010. North Somerset staff have coped extremely well but the growth in care costs has meant highlyvisible services have suffered from further reductions and were unsustainable. The waste collection service has been particularly affected, with many residents upset at missed collections and poor communication of what was happening. Some crews found they were unable to complete rounds because of the volume of waste on certain routes, and the new operators knew they needed to change its operations and routing. These have now been done and although the recent changes have caused their own problems as drivers get to know the new routes, early indications show that there is a marked improvement which will be a great relief to everyone. I can assure you that council officers involved are working tirelessly to get it right and are making real progress.

The other source of complaints recently has been the growth of vegetation on footpaths, roadsides and open spaces. Recent weather has led to more growth than usual and the reduced number of crews could not possibly cope. More crews have now been taken on and will be able to catch up. Please let your local councillor know if there are any particular areas that need

I mention these examples because of an article published recently which shows how local government had another nine per cent reduction in resources in just the last two years. But over the same period, the Local Government Ministry in London has grown by 18 per cent. How can central government say they understand what is happening locally when they seem to be employing more people in order to tell local authorities to employ fewer? We are constantly told about devolving decisions and responsibility but then see further centralisation. Surely employing more people locally would help local economies and, at the same time, reduce pressure on an overheated London. It might also help more people afford to buy some of the homes we are being forced to give permissions for, even though there is still no evidence of a need for so many.

The third runway at Heathrow has now been approved at a cost of about £18bn. This is alongside the HS2 railway at over £100bn. The cost estimates seem to keep changing. We are told these are investments for the future but then so is much-needed investment in local skills and employment. I agree with investing for the future, even in lean times, but investing in huge capital projects leads to ongoing repairs and running costs. Investing in skills, jobs and people leads to a social and economic profit.

Despite the difficulties, I am delighted to say investment in North Somerset continues and we are working with neighbouring authorities to improve long-term projects for sustainable infrastructure.

I hope you all have a good summer and are able to enjoy some of the hundreds of events across the area.



Are you fostering privately?

Private foster carers are being reminded they need to inform North Somerset Council about their living arrangements.

Private fostering is an informal arrangement when a child under 16 (or 18 if disabled) stays with someone who is not a close relative for more than 28 continuous days.

A close relative is a step-parent, grandparent, brother, sister, uncle or aunt, whether of full blood, half blood or marriage.

Examples of private fostering might include:

- a teenager living with the family of a boyfriend or girlfriend
- children living with a friend's family as a result of parental separation, divorce or arguments at home
- children sent to this country for education or health reasons by parents who live abroad.

Weston on the map for arts and culture

Arts and culture will continue to thrive in Weston-super-Mare thanks to £50,000 of new funding.

Since Banksy brought Dismaland to the Tropicana in 2015, the town has continued to develop its role as a significant coastal arts and culture destination and this has become a key element of North Somerset Council's regeneration and growth plans for the town.

The council has been working with Arts Council England South West (ACE SW) for the past two years to explore opportunities for projects and funding for arts initiatives.

Now ACE SW has allocated £50,000 towards establishing a cultural development company for Westonsuper-Mare and has identified the town's cultural development as a South West priority for 2018-20.

Chief executive of Arts Council England, Darren Henley, visited the town in May to see some of the cultural activity already on offer and discuss future potential.

During his visit he went to the Tropicana, Italian Gardens, The Stable creative hub, the Heritage Action Zone, Blakehay Theatre and Old Town Quarry.

Darren said: "There is a vibrant creative community here and a council with huge ambitions to redefine the English seaside town.

"Weston is a cultural and artistic gem, a beacon that other seaside towns can learn from.

"At the Arts Council we are passionate about taking great art and culture to the people.

"It can change places and we want to be with Weston on that journey for many years to come."

ACE SW has also introduced four national arts organisations to the town who are now in discussion with the council about future projects.

Volunteers needed to support vulnerable young people

Volunteers are needed to help and support young people in North Somerset to make positive life changes.

Junction 21, North Somerset Council's youth offending service volunteer mentoring project, is holding an open evening for potential volunteers to find out more about the scheme.

Volunteers support young people who are vulnerable for a variety of reasons, including being placed into care, poor school attendance or becoming involved in anti-social behaviour.

Would-be volunteers are asked to spare a couple of hours a week for a minimum of 12 months.

To take part, you must be over 21, have no criminal offences in the past five years and be clean of any substance misuse issues for five years.

Volunteers receive on-going training, gain a recognised qualification, have monthly group supervision, twice yearly group events and regular relationship reviews.



Fly tipping - the illegal dumping of waste - can pollute the environment and cost significant amounts of council tax payers' money to clear away.

All householders and businesses have a duty of care for any waste that they produce.

This means that you must dispose of it legally and only use licenced waste carriers. Fly tipping can carry a maximum fine of £50,000 or even more of the case goes to crown court, and a prison sentence of up to five years.

Any waste that you pay to have removed from your property is classed as commercial waste and needs to be disposed of accordingly.

It must not be taken to the recycling centres as these are for household waste only.

When having waste collected from you're your property or business remember SCRAP:

- Suspect if it doesn't look right it probably isn't
- Check ask for a waste carrier licence number issued by the Environment Agency
- Refuse unsolicited offers to take your waste
- Ask question where they will take your waste
- Paperwork you need a signed waste transfer note from the person collecting your waste.

If your waste is found fly tipped and you can't provide documentation showing who collected it, you can be prosecuted.

Sun safety



Fingers crossed the sun will shine this summer so it's worth remembering some sun protection tips for when it does.

You can burn even on a cloudy day in the UK and melanoma skin cancer is the fifth most common cancer.

It is largely preventable through good sun safety habits though so try following these simple steps:



Spend time in the shade, especially between 11am and 3pm



Take extra care if you have paler skin, moles, are only exposed to intense sun occasionally, or have a family history of skin cancer



If you're going to be in the sun long enough to burn, apply sunscreen twice: 30 minutes before going out and again just before you go out



Avoid burning and cover up with suitable clothing and sunglasses



Apply sunscreen to all exposed skin - face, neck and ears - and head if you have thinning or no hair. A wide-brimmed hat is even better



Reapply sunscreen liberally and often, including after being in the water even if using 'water resistant' ones



Take extra care with children as their skin is more sensitive, especially the very young. Babies under six months shouldn't be in direct sunlight



Watch out for changes to your skin, including a new mole, growth or lump, or any moles, freckles or patches of skin that change in size, shape or colour. Report these to your doctor as soon as possible. Skin cancer is much easier to treat when found early.



Check sunscreen isn't past its expiry date most last two to three vears. Use at least factor 15 sunscreen with at least four-star UVA



Apply enough sunscreen about two teaspoons for an adult's head, arms and neck, or two tablespoons for your entire body.



By car: from the A370 at Yatton. Parking is on residential roads in the village, so please park considerately (village hall car park is only for people using the venue)

By bus: X2 – Weston to Bristol service

Claverham, between Yatton and Cleeve, was originally a farming hamlet within the North Somerset levels. It was probably named after the clover fields which surround the village.

This walk takes a leisurely stroll along the village lanes. Start at the corner of High Street and Claverham Road.

The building on this corner was originally the village post office and more recently a restaurant.

Go along the High Street, passing Chestnut Drive on your left and Melanie's hairdressers and Pizza2Go on your right.



Continue along this road as it turns a sharp right corner. It becomes a lane and the pavement runs out so be careful of vehicles.

You will pass fields, with far-reaching views towards Clevedon on your left.

Continue on and you will come to the picturesque St Barnabas Church on the junction of Jasmine Lane and Brockley Way.

The grade II listed limestone church dates from 1879 and was completed as a daughter church to St Mary's in Yatton.

Continue on Brockley Way, past a forge and some stables. Follow it around the bend and you will come

to a t-junction. Turn left here and continue past some nurseries.

Continue along Lower Claverham. These lanes are popular with cyclists and horse riders on sunny days.

The lane winds between fields, past Chestnut Farm and Clover Nursery on the left, and Streamcross Farm on the right.


Carry on and you will then pass the picturesque Manor Cottage and splendid Claverham House on your right.

Grade II Claverham House dates from 1744, with 19th century additions including a wooden summerhouse and Victorian greenhouse.

Please note - this is a private house, not open to the public.

Shortly after here there is a left turn into Chestnut Drive.

Follow this until you meet the High Street again, facing Melanie's hairdressers and your start.







Health walks

If you'd like to enjoy more short, accessible walks, the health walks initiative could be just up your street.

Health walks are led by trained volunteers and last between 30 and 90 minutes.

They are the ideal first step for anyone wanting to become more active.

Six groups run across North Somerset, including Clevedon, Nailsea, Portishead, Weston-super-Mare, Winscombe and Yatton.

Plan for £4m improvements to Grove Park

Popular Grove Park in Weston-super-Mare could see £4m of improvements so locals and visitors can enjoy the town's 'secret garden' even more.

The park, at the northern end of the High Street, has a rich and varied heritage which reflects the character and history of its neighbourhood.

North Somerset Council is now exploring options for a programme of improvements and will be submitting the first stage of a Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) bid in August.

Work could include:

- renovating buildings, rockeries, ponds, boundaries, pathways, steps and planting to enhance the park's beauty and biodiversity
- improving the children's play area at the top
- developing the main entrance, enhancing the link between the High Street and the park
- training skilled apprenticeships in horticulture and heritage craft skills

- introducing park ambassadors to share their knowledge of the park's history with visitors
- linking with the Heritage Action Zone project to create a historic trail through the park and into the town centre.

John Flannigan, community and environment service manager at North Somerset Council, said: "As part of the proposed programme, the council will bid for £4m from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

"The process is in two stages and it's incredibly competitive, but we hope to progress to stage two at the end of the year.

"Grove Park is a wonderful, relaxing green space for many Westonians. The lottery funding will allow us to restore some of the heritage features, open up the park to visitors and locals, and return this secret garden to its former glory."

Friends from Grove Park said: "We are delighted with the proposed changes.

"Our group has worked hard to improve the park, including fundraising £10,000 in partnership with Osprey Outdoors for a bug hotel, renovating the rockery and working with Weston

College students to install new flowerbeds near the sports enclosure.

"We look forward to working with the council to bring this glorious park back to its original state."

Exhibition of aerial photography now open

Historic aerial photographs of Weston-super-Mare can now be viewed as part of a special exhibition celebrating the town's heritage.

Weston Past and Present is now open in Tiffany's Restaurant on the Grand Pier until 10 January next year.

It has been put together as part of the Heritage Action Zone initiative, with aerial photographs taken over the last few months by Historic England.

These are displayed alongside images of Weston from many years ago.

Cara MacMahon, Heritage Action Zone officer at North Somerset Council, said: "We wanted to feature archive and new imagery side-by-side to show how the landscape of

Michelle Michael, director and co-owner at the Grand Pier said: "We hope many people will visit and see for themselves how Weston has changed over the past century."

Weston was one of the first places in the country to be awarded Heritage Action Zone status.

The exhibition can be viewed in Tiffany's team room every day from 10am to 3pm until December.

Fifty years since the Great Floods

Fifty years have passed since heavy flooding hit the South West and homes and businesses were destroyed.

In July 1968, thunderstorms and torrential rain arrived in the region causing major damage, including locally in Congresbury and Wrington.

In more recent years, flooding also hit North Somerset in 2012 during the second wettest year on record in the UK, and again in 2016.

Life takes a look at the work which continues to be done in the area to reduce the risk.

Flood risk

Flooding can threaten lives and cause substantial damage to people, property, infrastructure and land.

While flooding is a natural process and cannot be completely prevented, it can be managed.

North Somerset Council has responsibility for managing flooding

from surface water, ordinary watercourses such as ditches and streams, and groundwater sources, as well as drainage from the road network.

Tidal flooding and main rivers remain the responsibility of the Environment Agency.

The council has developed a local flood risk management strategy and continues to work with partners such as the Environment Agency and Wessex Water to develop action plans.

Larger flood relief schemes are currently being completed in Wrington and the Summer Lane area of Weston-super-Mare.

Summer Lane suffered flooding twice in 2012 and again in 2016, when at one stage 4,000 litres of water was pumped every minute to protect local homes and businesses.






Approximate extent of flooding without Environment Agency defences

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Following the 2012 flooding, council officers produced a hydraulic model to analyse it and consider possible solutions.

Government funding of £240,000 was identified for the project, North Somerset Council agreed to provide £212,000, and in April this year the government announced the scheme would receive an additional £430,000 of funding.

Suggested improvements include raising the current embankments on the existing wet and dry ponds, building a new dry pond flood storage area, improving the ditch drainage and adding a new culvert crossing under Bransby Way.

Once completed, the project will provide nearby properties with a protection level of a 'one-in-200-years' flood event.

What happened in 1968?

Heavy rain arrived from northern France on the morning of Monday, 8 July and continued throughout the day.

Water levels in rivers and ditches across the South West began to rise but the flood defences of the time held strong.

The storm slowed during the early hours of Tuesday morning but following a sunny Wednesday morning, a second, larger rain front arrived.

Thunderstorms and torrential rain began, which was later recorded as a one-in-60-year event.

Severe flooding occurred in many towns and villages across the South West within hours, as much of the land was still saturated from Monday's rain.

In total seven people across the South West lost their lives and homes and businesses were destroyed. The Duke of Edinburgh later visited some of the worst-affected areas.

In North Somerset, Congresbury suffered major flooding and markers can still be spotted in local pubs to show the highest water level.

Major flood defences were later installed in the village to reduce the risk of such severe flooding happening again.

Trained volunteers in Congresbury and Wrington have joined North Somerset's Community Resilience scheme.

Walk your way to health

Summer is the perfect time to be more active and small lifestyle changes could make a big difference to your long-term health and wellbeing.

Many of us know we should be getting more exercise but struggle to fit it in but did you know that walking briskly for just 10 continuous minutes counts as exercise?

Brisk walking means going at a faster pace than usual to get your heart pumping.

And an app from Public Health England makes it easier to fit it into each day.

The free Active 10 app tracks your walking and tells you when to up the pace, whether you are walking to work, the shops, or getting some fresh air in the evening sunshine.

It's the only app of its kind to combine intensity and time, rather than just distance or number of steps.

Nearly 2,000 people in North Somerset have already downloaded the app and achieved nearly 37,000 hours of brisk walking between them.

Free lifestyle support

Residents in Weston-super-Mare could access up to 12 sessions of healthy lifestyle support - for free.

North Somerset Council's Health Trainer service provides free and confidential one-to-one support to help people reach their personal goals and improve their health and wellbeing.

This might be to eat more healthily, exercise more, lose weight, stop smoking or reduce alcohol intake.

Some support can be offered in a group setting to enable you to gain from other people's experiences as well.

The service is available to Weston residents aged 18 or over.

Anyone not meeting this criteria will be referred to another organisation which can help.

Caring residents in North Somerset are opening up their family homes to accommodate people with extra needs.

The Shared Lives scheme sees people welcoming adults into their own home to help them live a full and meaningful life, whether on a full-time, short break or daily basis.

This might include older people, those living with dementia, a learning disability, those with mental health difficulties, or physical or sensory impairments.

John, aged 33, has a learning disability and recently moved out of a small care home where he had been living for nine years.

His social worker suggested the Shared Lives scheme so he was matched with a family and had several day visits and overnight stays to get to know them before moving in. They have now all adjusted to living together and John likes to be part of the family as well as enjoying having freedom and control.

Homeowner Abi said: "John has settled in really well, he has an amazing sense of humour."

The family have had meals out together, day trips, swimming sessions, and John enjoys walking the dog.

Abi supported John to buy himself a bike and John is now loving the independence and freedom, and regularly goes on bike rides with one of Abi's children.

John said:

"I feel valued and that I belong."

Shared Lives carers come from all walks of life and do not need specific qualifications or experience.

Families go through a thorough assessment and receive training and on-going support.

The role is paid and fees depend on what service is provided, how many people are supported and what sort of support each person needs.



Rural businesses expandin

Rural businesses and North Somerset are expanding thanks to new grants aimed improving wellbeing.

Businesses and comunities in rural parts of the area have succeeded in securing funding through the West of England Rural Development programme and LEADER fund.

Grants of between £10,000 and £100,000 were available and applicants had to go through a rigorous two-stage process.

Projects had to meet one of the national LEADER priorities and additional local West of England priorities.

These priorities focused on areas such as futureproofed food production,



farming and horticulture; having a successful rural tourism infrastructure: a diverse and vibrant culture and heritage, and more.

Successful grant awards in North Somerset to date include:

- more than £93,000 to Failand Farm to create a biodynamic winery and cider mill
- nearly £80,000 to Trethowan's Dairy, in Hewish, to build a new cheddar plant
- more than £84,000 to St Michael's Church, in Dundry, for modification and improvement works
- £24,000 to Bradley's Juice, in Hewish, for a new filling, washing and bottling line
- more than £10,000 to oak building manufacturer Westwind Oak, in Yatton, for workshop development
- more than £10,000 to cider makers Ganley and Naish, in Kenn, for expansion of cider production
- £83,000 to Aldwick Court Farm, in Blagdon, to expand the wine making facility, create new tourism accommodation and on-site catering to support wedding and conferencing
- £215,000 to Jacklands Fishing Lakes, in Nailsea, for a new farm shop and production facilities for a trout farm.

Trethowan's Dairy

An award-winning Caerphilly cheese producer is expanding its product line and making better use of its quality milk supply.

Trethowan's is a family-run business based at Puxton Court Farm, in Hewish, and it has made mature Caerphilly cheese using a traditional recipe for more than 20 years.

The business relocated to Hewish from west Wales in 2014 due to the quality of milk at the farm.

Co-director Maugan Trethowan said: "The milk is perfect for our cheesemaking but we are only using about half of what the herd produces.

"To make the most of the milk supply, we wanted to start producing a new cheese.

"Being so close to Cheddar, we decided it would be fantastic to make a traditional. unpasteurised, clothbound West Country cheddar."

The £80,000 funding helped pay for the specialist equipment needed to start making cheddar and towards building a store next to the dairy.

Maugan added: "It's very difficult to get a new cheddar off the ground as the cheese takes about a year to mature, so there has to be a large investment in milk during the first year of production before we see any return.

"Having the equipment and cheddar store funded has been a real help in terms of cash flow for this project."

The first batch of cheddar, called Pitchfork, is currently maturing at another dairy in Somerset until the store room at Trethowan's is finished.

Maugan added: "This will make a massive difference to our business.

"It means we will be using our dairy to full capacity and we'll be able to employ more local people as we increase to six days a week production from our current three days a week."





Organic and biodynamic cider and wine will soon be produced in Failand thanks to more than £93,000 of funding.

The cider mill and vineyard at Failand Farm is now taking shape and 3,100 vines have been planted this year.

Matthew Stephenson, who runs the farm together with his wife Philipa and their son John, said: "We were delighted to have our application accepted and to know our vision for a collaborative hub in North Somerset, specialising in the natural production of wines and ciders, resonated with the awarding body."



The vineyard is using organic processes and

biodynamic agriculture, a way of treating soil fertility and plant growth as interrelated and emphasising the use of manure and composts.

Work is progressing well and they are on-track to be ready for this year's harvest.

Matthew said: "Our partners Limeburn Hill Biodynamic Vineyard and cidermakers Sam and Beccy Leach will be using the space this autumn, with Failand Farm's own vineyard producing its first harvest in 2019.

"All three of us share a philosophy of using organic or biodynamically grown fruit, minimal use of additives, and wild ferments using naturally occurring yeast."

New jobs are being created at the farm as a result of the expansion.





Driving growth to

Spending money with small and medium-sized businesses can help drive economic growth so North Somerset Council is making this a priority in its own business.

The Federation of Small Businesses says that doing business locally is better value for money because for every £1 spent with a small or medium-sized business, 63p is re-spent in the local area compared to 40p with a larger business.

North Somerset Council has made it a priority to drive growth in North Somerset's economy and support local jobs, so is putting its money where its mouth is by using local suppliers where possible.

The council spends £170m a year commissioning goods, works and services from its suppliers to help deliver local services.

Mark Roddan, head of strategic procurement at North Somerset Council, said: "Councils must focus on providing the maximum benefit into their communities from every

taxpayer pound that is spent, and take responsibility for generating economic, environmental and social growth in their local communities "

In 2010, the government announced an aspiration for 25 per cent of its spending to go to small and mediumsized businesses (SMEs) by 2015, extending this to 33 per cent by 2020.

During 2016/17, North Somerset Council spent 35 per cent with SMEs, so is already exceeding the target.

It has now made it part of its procurement rules that preference should be given to local suppliers for all contracts below £5,000, and local suppliers should be included in the list of companies invited to tender for contracts up to £50,000.

For larger contracts where local suppliers do not exist, or there are other reasons for considering non

local suppliers, the council wants to optimise the amount of work that can be sub-contracted to local suppliers.





small businesses

Mark said: "We also work with local suppliers to ensure they are aware of upcoming opportunities in advance of a formal tender process, and to help them understand our requirements better and submit competitive bids.



"This might include meeting potential suppliers to get their feedback on specifications before they are issued."

One such firm which has recently benefited is Weston-super-Mare-based John West Contractors.

This family-run business carries out general building work as well as plumbing, heating and electrical work.


It has now been awarded a 12-month contract to provide reactive maintenance services to council buildings.

Mark said: "Our previous contractor did not want to continue with their contract and we had to find a solution with short notice.

"We spoke to a various local and national contractors but chose John West because they had good experience and capable people, and their charges were very competitive."

Managing director Mark Bass said: "It was great news to hear that we

had been awarded the contract to provide reactive maintenance services to North Somerset Council



"The beneficial effect to the local economy can only be good for us all."

The public sector procurement process is governed by a wide range of laws which can make bidding very complex, but North Somerset Council is also looking to simplify the processes.

It can also provide support and advice to smaller suppliers, and constructive feedback to unsuccessful suppliers.

Investment in roads



Last winter presented some of the biggest challenges in more than 10 years for North Somerset Council's highways maintenance team.

Repeated cycles of ice and thaw, below average temperatures and snow stretched resources to the limit and caused lasting damage to roads.

In total, North Somerset's gritters went out 118 times from November, compared with just 40 trips the year before.

More than 3,500 tonnes of salt was used to grit the 31,419 miles covered by North Somerset's six gritters.

This equates to travelling to Australia, then back home, and back to Australia again.

The council also had to put snowploughs onto gritters on two occasions - something that had not been needed for five years.

The arrival of snow in March caused widespread disruption as it drifted off fields and onto roads.

Clearing roads during unsociable hours and in difficult conditions became a team effort, with great support from the council's maintenance contractor Skanska, farming contractors Jon Sealy and Sons, and Nick Bartlett and Pete Tuckfield services who installed road closures and filled grit bins.

Everyone involved helped to keep main, strategic routes passable.

The damage

Four months after the snow, the council is still dealing with the fallout from an extreme winter.

Due to the severity of the conditions, the Government's Department for Transport (DfT) has provided councils with extra funding for pothole repairs but more support is still needed.

The money provided by the DfT has been used to fund the hire of a spray injection patcher machine to carry out repairs at well-known pothole hotspots.

The patcher, which can repair carriageway defects quickly, has been used for 16 weeks between March and July.

It cleans and coats the defected base with binder, fills it with coated chips and then adds a top layer of binder and chips. A built-in sweeper takes care of any loose chips on the road while the roller wheels provide additional compaction, leaving a long lasting and well-defined patch.

The machine can quickly and effectively apply single or multiple sealing layers to the cracked surface, extending the life of the road at minimum cost, and with very little disruption to normal traffic.

All work is carried out by a single person from within the safety of a cab.

Prevention rather than cure

Even with extra funding to repair potholes, the council has a packed programme to ensure road conditions are maintained and a proactive 'whole life' approach is taken.

Preventative work is carried out wherever possible to extend the life of a road surface before potholes start to form and the road condition deteriorates to a point where a much more expensive repair is needed.

Improving roads remains a priority despite budget pressures and results from a DfT survey show this is paying

The 2017 results rated the area's roads as some of the best in the country.

How do potholes form?

A pothole is a structural failure in a road surface due to water in the underlying soil structure and traffic passing over the affected area.

Water weakens the underlying soil and traffic then fatigues and breaks the poorly supported asphalt surface in the affected area.

Continued traffic removes both asphalt and the underlying soil material to create a hole.

As part of this, a £5m annual carriageway surfacing programme began in June.

Key schemes to be completed include Birnbeck Road in Weston, Rownham Hill in Leigh Woods, Tickenham Hill in Tickenham, and Broadoak Hill in Dundry.

The council will continue to use crews to repair potholes and highway defects where needed and is using the spray injection patcher again during late summer for 10 weeks.

New highways maintenance contract

A £50m road maintenance contract has been signed by North Somerset Council, promising to deliver a transport network which 'meets the needs of road users now and in the future'.

The council has agreed a five-year contract with Skanska to improve the condition of the area's roads and deliver the best possible value for money.

Skanska held the previous road maintenance contract, which finished in March.

It will maintain road surfaces, dainage, road markings and provide emergency response and temporary traffic management services.

Gone in 20 seconds

A well sorted recycling box can take as little as 20 seconds for crews to collect compared with two minutes for an unsorted one

Sorting your recycling means crews can collect it faster and traffic congestion on the roads is reduced.

In the first box, plastic (except black) bottles, pots, tubs and trays can be mixed together with tins, cans and gerosols.


Paper needs to be kept separate and textiles should be bagged and loosely tied to keep them clean and dry.


In the second box, cardboard and cartons can be flattened together and glass should be kept separate.

Batteries should be bagged, but not tied, as crews struggle to collect them when they are loose in the box.

Please ensure:

- containers are out by 7am on your collection day
- your rubbish bin does not contain anything which could be recycled
- the bin lid is closed
- you do not put out extra sacks of non-recyclable rubbish as these will not be collected.





FA()s

Do I need two recycling boxes?

A second box can make it easier to separate your materials. We recently sent two new box stickers with your collection dates letter to show how to sort.

If you only have one box and do not create much recycling then you can continue with just one but please still separate the items inside.

Should I have dividers for my boxes?

The dividing lines shown in the illustration are there to make it clearer how materials should be separated. You do not need dividers in your boxes, just group the materials together as shown.

What should I do with excess waste?

If you are recycling as much as possible then you shouldn't be generating excess general rubbish. If you do, you can take it to one of the three recycling centres in North Somerset.

If you have more recycling than can fit in your boxes, with the exception of glass, it can be put into separate, untied carrier bags next to your boxes for collection.

The key to composting is balance: a good composter needs air, moisture, shelter, warmth and a mixture of 'green' fruit and veg peelings, grass, plants and flowers, and 'brown' hedge trimmings, paper, cardboard, twigs and leaves.

New life given to old items

Furniture, books, electrical items and bric-a-brac are all being diverted from landfill and reused thanks to a scheme at Portishead recycling centre.



North Somerset Council launched a reuse section at the Valley Road centre in April, working with the charity Changing Lives.

Residents who have good-quality, pre-loved items which someone else could make use of can drop them off to be reused locally.

The reuse area can be found near the exit of the recycling centre, so pack your vehicle with this in mind as you will reach it at the end of your visit.

Anyone with any questions or who needs help can ask a member of staff.

It is hoped the reuse scheme can be introduced at North Somerset's other two recycling centres in the future.

Ramparts and pits have recently been revealed at an 'outstanding' Iron Age hillfort in Weston-super-Mare.

Worlebury Camp occupies 10 hectares on Worlebury Hill, overlooking Weston Bay, Sand Bay and the Bristol Channel, and is an outstanding monument due to its rare coastal location, size and considerable defences.

The site is a Scheduled Monument, the highest protection an archaeological monument can be given.

However, it was put on the Heritage at Risk register in 2016 because of the harm caused to it, including vandalism, tree and vegetation growth and fly tipping.

To combat this, North Somerset Council is working with volunteers from the Worlebury Hillfort Group and other local interest groups to raise awareness of the importance of the hillfort and create a management plan for the site.

North Somerset Council's archaeologist Cat Lodge said:

"The volunteers have been working hard to clear parts of the interior of the hillfort of unwanted vegetation and have exposed some amazing pits for people to see."

The significant eastern ramparts have also been cleared by the council's grounds maintenance contractors Glendale.

Campfires, removal of stones and metal detecting are all prohibited as they damage the archaeology.

This includes building 'play forts' or shelters from the rocks on the site.

Cat said: "Whether you have visited before, or would like to see the hillfort for the first time, take a walk around it and imagine yourself transported back 2,000 years.

"Such an impressive structure should be enjoyed but respected, so please bear in mind that this is a Scheduled Monument."





What is a hillfort?

Hillforts are defended settlements, surrounded by circuits of banks and ditches.

They are regarded as centres of permanent occupation, built in response to increasing warfare from the middle of the Iron Age onwards, and provide a powerful insight into how people lived more than 2,000 years ago.

The location chosen for hillforts were incredibly important.

Worlebury Camp is mostly hidden by trees that were first planted in the 1820s.

Before the 19th century, though, it would have been open to the elements and its defences visible for miles around.

It has a set of seven banks and ditches on the eastern ramparts, meaning it is a 'multivallate' hillfort (many ditches).

The ramparts were constructed in a series of dry stone walls which acted as buttresses for additional defence, with a wooden fence on top.



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These walls now appear as huge heaps of tumbled stones and are most obviously visible at the eastern ramparts.

The northern side of the hillfort uses the natural cliff as a line of defence.

Archaeological studies have previously been undertaken at Worlebury Camp, with excavations recorded in 1851 by Rev F Warre and in the 1880s by C W Dymond.

During these excavations, 93 pits were identified, as well as pottery vessels, bone, wood and antler tools, and even human burials.

Other features such as entrances and large ditches were also recorded.

Cat said: "The 93 pits were stone-lined and grain such as barley, spelt wheat and oats were recovered, suggesting they were used for storage.

"Some contained skeletons and it is believed by some that these were ritual burials, signifying a special symbolic meanina.

"Some burials were discovered with iron weapons and both the skeletons and walls of the fort show signs of a hostile attack.

"Some skulls also showed evidence of wounds and the rampart material appears to have been burned. Slingstones and spears were also found along the southern ramparts.

"Although the end of the hillfort's life appears to have been an unpleasant one, we hope to learn more about the lives of its inhabitants through reexamination of some of the artefacts."

Bringing empty homes back into use



Empty properties are a wasted resource so help is at hand for owners to bring them back into use.

Houses left empty in the longterm can deteriorate, become a target for vandalism, attract anti-social behaviour and decrease in value.

Major repair to your empty property

One option to help owners get their property back into use is lowcost loans to help with renovation, available from Wessex Resolutions.

Chris and his sister Julie inherited a property which was uninhabitable so were having no luck in selling it.

They approached Wessex Resolutions to discuss the loan scheme.

Chris said: "Following the assessment, we sourced quotes from our chosen contractors which came to £15,000.

"We got a deferred capital repayment loan, which meant we didn't need to make any repayments for the first two years.

A range of free incentives are available to make letting your property more attractive. such as bonds for deposits and dedicated support from a lettings officer.

Get vocal, be heard 🕏





Listening to residents' views is an important part of the democratic process and North Somerset Council welcomes ideas to make things better.

While the council can't act on every suggestion, it listens to feedback and makes changes where possible.

You said:

I don't often have small change on me to pay for on-street car parking. What can be done?

We did:

On-street parking charges in Westonsuper-Mare can now be paid for through your smartphone thanks to the introduction of a virtual permit system.

The MiPermit pay-by-phone service had been introduced in most council car parks and it has now been rolled out to on-street pay and display areas in Weston.

People can either pay the parking charge by texting from a mobile phone or by downloading the free MiPermit app.

This means drivers who do not have cash or the right money on them can get a ticket, and there is no risk of a ticket falling off the windscreen.

A reminder text can also be sent. giving a 20-minute notification that their virtual ticket is going to expire.

Once purchased, a virtual ticket will appear on the civil enforcement officer's handset so they will know who has purchased it.

The two-hour maximum stay per street and no return for two hours, remains in force during the restricted hours in the on-street pay and display areas.

Notices and signs should still be observed. If used in off-street car parks, the virtual ticket can be extended without having to return to the vehicle or car park.

Dear Editor,

I try to sort my recycling boxes but there always seems to be plastic items left after my collection. Please can someone advise me what plastics I am able to recycle?

Editor's reply:

We recycle plastic bottles, tubs, pots and trays. These plastic items can be clear or coloured, but not black plastic. We also cannot accept bubble wrap, polystyrene or plastic film - including crisp packets, chocolate wrappers, or cellophane. Please take film off your pots and trays. Hard plastics such as children's toys, plant pots and garden furniture are not recyclable. Remember to always wash, squash and sort your recycling.

Dear Editor

We know we should recycle food waste but the compostable liners are so expensive we couldn't afford to keep buying them. Can we use anything instead?

Editor's reply:

You no longer need compostable liners because North Somerset's food waste is sent to anaerobic digestion in Weston-super-Mare rather than being composted. Instead you can line your caddy with a plastic bag. You could make use of bread bags or carrier bags to line your caddy, or buy the small rolls of plastic bin liners in supermarkets which are much cheaper than compostable liners.

Dear Editor
